Dental hygienists are essential to the effective delivery of oral health care in the United States. State laws differ on whether hygienists may practice independently from dentists, whatservices hygienists may provide to patients and in what settings, and the extent of supervisionby dentists that is required for hygienists to practice. Independent Practice Prohibited

Fifteen jurisdictions expressly prohibit the independent practice ofdental hygienists.

Volunteer Hygienists

Hygienists may provide services to patients as volunteers in 31 jurisdictions.

Applying Fluoride

Hygienists may perform fluoride treatments on patients in 43jurisdictions.
