### **Long-Term Involuntary Commitment Laws**


Long-term involuntary commitment laws establish the process by which a person is placed into treatment in a health care facility. Every state has laws regulating long-term involuntary commitment, but states diverge on whether emergency commitment is required before long- term involuntary commitment, whether individuals may obtain an independent medical evaluation before a commitment hearing, and whether long-term involuntary commitment restricts the patient's firearm rights. # **Emergency Commitment Required before Long-Term Involuntary Commitment**

Fourteen states and D.C. require emergency commitment before a long-term involuntarily commitment.

Jurisdictions: 15 (AK, AZ, CA, DC, DE, GA, MA, ME, MO, NM, OK, SD, VA, WA, WY)



### **Independent Medical Evaluation**

Thirty-two states and D.C. allow individuals to obtain an independent medical evaluation before a commitment hearing.

Jurisdictions: 33 (AK, AZ, DC, DE, FL, GA, HI, IA, IL, KY, LA, MA, MI, MN, MO, MT, ND, NE, NM, NV, OH, OR, RI, SC, SD, TN, TX, UT, VA, VT, WA, WI, WV)



### **Limitation of Firearm Rights**

All but four states (AK, KY, NH and VT) limit an individual's rights to possess a firearm due to an involuntary commitment.
