The patient centered medical home (PCMH) has become an important health care delivery model in the evolving US health care system. Many states have created advisory councils to develop policies for implementing the model and are now requiring that public and private health insurance plans cover PCMH services. PCMH Model Recognized

Forty-one states and the District of Columbia have laws that recognize the patient centered medical home model of health care delivery.
